Our Amazing Craigmillar Castle Tour Guide Launch



Our P7s have been working extremely hard this term, learning their lines, rehearsing and filming for our Junior Tour Guides performances at Craigmillar Castle. They have worked with Miss White, Miss McGrory and professionals from Illuminate UK who have taught them performance skills, including acting skills and how to use their voice in a performance.

This year the tour has been put together in a slightly different way. We have two different performances, one that looks at what life was like at Craigmillar Castle in the 1500s, and a second that focuses on Mary Queen of Scots time at the castle. Half the class play the roles of Sir Simon Preston, Lady Elizabeth Preston, and the members of their household, and the other half act as object handlers, showing and describing artefacts preserved from castle life in the 16th Century.

On Tuesday 11th September the children gave live performances to their parents and carers at the castle, and what incredible performances they gave! We are all so proud of them.

Both tours have been filmed, with funding from Historic Environment Scotland who own and preserve the castle, and are our Junior Tour Guides partners. The films of each tour will be available on our school website, we hope by mid-November.

Children's Rights


The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) is a legally-binding international agreement setting out the civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights of every child, regardless of their race, religion or abilities.

Children's Rights are central to our language of Learning. Education of and ensuring that Children's rights are met is built into our curriculum at Castleview. Links to children's rights are discussed in all learning to reinforce how important these are for children to have and how important it is for them to respect. In each class the children create and sign a charter agreeing to respect four key rights. These rights are:

- •Right to learn and go to school, Article 28
- •Right to be the best you can be, Article 29
- •You should not be harmed and should be looked after and kept safe, Article 19
- •Right to relax and play, Article 31

It is so important you to come to school. We miss you when you are not here!

Every day plays an incredibly important part of your child's week and each day includes valuable learning and teaching time. As a parent or carer, you have a legal responsibility for ensuring that your child's attendance at school is the best it can be. Should attendance concerns persist, school staff will reach out to support you. We want to help.

Where attendance falls below 85%, this means that your child has missed at least 27 days at school ie almost half a term. Falling below 85% can trigger action from the Education Welfare Officer.

It's essential when pupils are absent that we know the reason for this as soon as possible. This can be done through a telephone call to our school office on the number listed below, or through a written note. If your child is absent for more than one day, please keep school staff updated. Unconfirmed absences from school are marked as 'T' which means that we have not been informed of a reason for their non-attendance.

Please remember to ask for help if you are experiencing difficulties in supporting your child's attendance or punctuality. Thank you for your continued support.



The evening was topped off with an amazing feast as families came together to share food from their culture. Thank you to all those who came along. It was a very powerful evening created and organised by Primary Five.










Show Racism the Red Card




please dress for the weather

Building Resilience – Look on the Bright Side

Building Resilience is a compulsory Health and Wellbeing programme for pupils of City of Edinburgh primary schools. It aims to support the development of mental, emotional, social and physical wellbeing through learning and teaching in partnership with staff, parents and pupils. It aims to help children function well, both at school and in life. It provides practical strategies and tools to help children and families cope with the ups and downs of life. It promotes partnerships with families and the wider school communities. Finally, it provides skills for life.

This term our Building Resilience Unit has been 'Look on the Bright Side'. This tool links to UNCRC articles 28 (right to an education) and 17 (right to information that is important to your wellbeing) and the healthy wellbeing indicator from SHANARRI. It explores the following:

- The way you think can affect the way you feel.
- There are different ways of looking at the same thing.
- Focussing on what you are grateful for can help.
